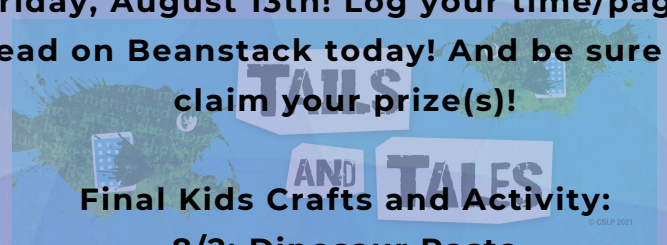

A unique sight is in store for you in the Young Adult Fiction section of the library: if you look up, you'll see beautiful black and white cranes flowing serenely from the ceiling, with crystals mirroring the light.
